

## AMES PREPARES TO HOST RAGBRAI RIDERS OVERNIGHT IN JULY

The community's population will grow by tens of thousands on Tuesday, July 25, as participants in the Register's Annual Great Bicycle Ride Across Iowa (RAGBRAI) spend the night in Ames before heading off to Des Moines.

This year marks RAGBRAI's 50th anniversary, and a record number of cyclists are anticipated to enjoy the week-long trek across the state as it replicates much of the original route. Ames was an overnight stop on the first RAGBRAI in 1973, and has served as an overnight town in 1983, 2008, and most recently in 2018.

Organizing the overnight stay will be a community-wide endeavor. Discover



Ames (formerly the Ames Convention & Visitors Bureau) will lead a local organizing committee consisting of leaders from the City of Ames, Ames Chamber of Commerce and Downtown Ames, Story County, and Iowa State University.

Similar to 2018, Downtown Ames will

serve as the hub for entertainment. This year, the main stage band will be coordinated by RAGBRAI and announced in the spring. Details about the Ames overnight stay are still being addressed, but residents should expect an influx of cyclists on Tuesday, July 25, and a stream of cyclists heading south the next day. Plan ahead and give yourself extra time if you need to get somewhere during the RAGBRAI visit.

For nearly 25 years, the flowers surrounding Ames park signs have brought beauty and color to life. Volunteer gardeners plant and maintain approximately 50 gardens throughout Ames with flowers donated by Holub Garden & Greenhouses.

The Adopt-A-Flower program pairs flower donations by Holub with volunteer gardeners. The volunteers are responsible for spring planting and maintenance throughout the growing season, such as weeding and seasonal cleanup. City staff provide guidance on plant selection and maintenance, and assist with watering during the growing season. The program includes both experienced and novice gardeners. #### WATER RATES TO INCREASE IN JULY

The Ames City Council will give final approval soon to an 8 percent increase in water rates, effective for bills due on and after July 1, 2023.



The need for the proposed rate adjustment is a reflection of increased costs combined with high user demand over the past year. A significant impact to operating the Water Utility has been unprecedented increase in chemical costs including a 78 percent increase in chlorine.

One way to reduce the increase in your water bill is through conservation. This is the time to inspect irrigation systems for frozen or broken lines and make sure heads are only delivering water to

plantings that truly need to be watered. Consider investing in a rain barrel to help with your outdoor watering and converting traditional turf into low impact, native plantings that need less water. Rebates are available to reduce some of the initial investment at www.CityOfAmes.org/SmartWatersheds.

# WATCH FOR TRAFFIC CREWS

To counter the wear and tear of a long winter, City of Ames traffic crews will begin re-striping streets; painting curbs, crosswalks, stop bars, and symbols; and refreshing parking lot lines the first week in May. Painting takes place every year after the temperatures are warm enough to apply paint, and surfaces have warmed enough for the paint to properly adhere.

By the end of the season, crews will have painted the equivalent of a 4-inch stripe from Ames to Minneapolis, Minn., or about 200 miles of new street markings.

Street and curb painting can have a temporary impact on traffic flow by requiring brief lane closures. Although the paint applied is quick drying, drivers can help by paying attention to their surroundings and proceeding slowly when traveling in areas where crews are working.

Q: It's great that Ames has made some additions to its Smart Energy Rebate offerings. Are there other places that I can find additional funding to help make some energy improvements to my home?

**A:** Yes, in addition to the new Smart Energy rebates – which you can review at www.CityOfAmes.org/SmartEnergy – there are new, larger federal tax credits for a whole range of home energy efficiency projects. These projects existed in the past but were much smaller and had a cumulative lifetime cap.

The Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) brought several changes, one of which is the extension of the residential energy efficiency tax credits. Many home upgrades from insulation to water heating to new heat pumps are eligible for a tax credit of up to 30 percent of their installed cost, and there is now a much higher annual limit of the amount of tax credits you can take.

Additionally, the renewable energy tax credits have been renewed at their full 30 percent levels. Both geothermal and solar are eligible upgrades (and these two practices have no upper limit on cost). The renewable energy tax credits and the residential energy efficiency tax credits run through 2032.

The federal tax credit for electric vehicles (EVs) was also renewed in 2023, but vehicles will need to be under a certain price with an identified percentage of each vehicle's manufacturing based in the United States to qualify for the

credit. New this year is an EV tax credit for used electric vehicles (up to \$4,000) for income-qualified households (under \$150,000



per year for joint filers). Remember, if you're purchasing an EV, there is now a Smart Energy rebate that provides up to \$500 for Level 2 vehicle chargers.
