KEEPING AMES GREEN INCLUDES ENCOURAGING TREE PLANTING

The benefits of trees are well documented, and Ames has a long history of nurturing its beautiful and diverse urban forest. The City offers a rebate to encourage residents to plant trees on their own property. Because trees can live for decades, it's important to be strategic and deliberate about tree planting. City Forester Gabriele Edwards has some fun facts about trees and tips to help your trees thrive.

"The shade from large, established trees can lower the surface temperature by 20-45 degrees compared to unshaded areas, not to mention the ambient temperature reduction from the tree's evapotranspiration," Edwards said. When combined with the myriad of other benefits including reduced atmosphere particulates, higher soil infiltration, and reduced stormwater runoff, planting trees is great for people and the planet. But did you

know that planting a tree is not just digging a hole, putting the tree in the hole, and watering?

"There are specific steps that need to be done correctly to ensure a healthy, happy tree that will give you back all of these wonderful benefits," Edwards said. Planting trees involves careful consideration of the tree's root ball, creating a hole that's wide enough but not too deep, adding organic mulch to retain moisture and protect the roots from the elements, and protecting the trunk from injury. WATER RATE Increase to Begin in July

The Ames City Council will give final approval soon to an 8 percent increase in water rates, effective for bills due on and after July 1, 2023.

The need for the proposed rate adjustment is a reflection of increased costs combined with high user demand over the past year. A significant impact to operating the Water Utility has been unprecedented increase in chemical costs including a 78 percent increase for chlorine.

One way to reduce the increase in your water bill is through conservation. This is the time to inspect irrigation systems for frozen or broken lines and make sure heads are only delivering water to plantings that truly need to be watered.

Consider investing in a rain barrel to help with your outdoor watering and converting traditional turf into low impact, native plantings that need less water.

CONSUMER CONFIDENCE REPORT AVAILABLE

The Consumer Confidence Report, the City's annual water quality report, is now available. This report contains important information about the quality of your drinking water.

At one time, the Consumer Confidence Report was included in your utility bill, but now the report is available to read online. This method of distribution helps promote our sustainability efforts and reduces costs. However, printed copies of the Consumer Confidence Report are still available.

Q: I know summer is on the way and hot temperatures are coming. What should I do now so I'm prepared later?

A: Great question. Spring is here and warm weather will soon be with us again. Last year, we were all caught by surprise by the early return of summer heat on May 12. There were many service calls that day from customers that didn't realize their air conditioner was in need of repair. Beat the heat and contact your HVAC provider for a seasonal tune-up now.

Here are several reasons why you should consider tuning up your AC this spring:

- Improved Efficiency: Regular maintenance of your AC unit can help ensure that it is running at maximum efficiency, which can lead to lower energy bills and less strain on your system.
- Increased Lifespan: Routine maintenance can also extend the lifespan of your AC unit, as technicians identify and address potential problems before they become issues.
- Enhanced Comfort: An AC unit that is functioning optimally will provide more consistent and reliable cooling throughout your home, leading to greater comfort for you and your family.

• Peace of Mind: Regular tune-ups can provide peace of mind, as you can rest assured that your AC



unit is in good working order and less likely to break down unexpectedly during the hottest days of the year.

If a technician recommends that you replace your air conditioner for any reason, be sure to ask about upgrading to a heat pump that can heat and cool with clean, reliable electricity. The City's Biodiesel Program has reached a milestone. The City of Ames has used B20 (20% biodiesel) in fleet vehicles and equipment since 1997. In 2020, the city began using B100 (100% biodiesel) in select vehicles. The combined use of B20 and B100 fuel in the City's fleet has offset over 500 metric tons (MT) of carbon emissions in 3 years. The 500 MT is equivalent to carbon emissions from electricity consumed in 48 households for THREE years.
