PARK ENHANCEMENTS PLANNED & PROJECT UPDATES PROVIDED

Maintaining and improving the community's 40 parks adds to the quality of life for all Ames residents. Parks and Recreation Department staff stay busy year-round to keep parks open and accessible in every season. They also look for ways to bring new experiences to visitors.

There are several park projects planned for this year, and many others slated for the future. At Brookside Park, a tree initially designated for removal was transformed into a whimsical sculpture through the talents of a wood carver. Woodland creatures are featured around the trunk of the walnut tree while an owl watches from the top. Visitors can enjoy the sculpture, which is located north of the Sixth Street park entrance.

Several parks have had upgrades recently including new pickleball courts at Emma McCarthy Lee Park, renovations to the stairs and tennis court resurfacing at Inis Grove Park, and shelter improvements at Country Gables Park. A new mini-pitch court will be installed in Lloyd Kurtz Park this year as



well. Playground equipment will also be replaced at Country Gables, Christopher Gartner, Lloyd Kurtz, Bandshell, Stuart Smith, Christofferson, and Patio Homes West Parks.

In the coming years, watch for the addition of a new agility course this year at Carr Park. For those interested in increasing their physical fitness or pushing themselves with a "ninja inspired" workout, the agility course will add some new challenges. The asphalt paths around Ada Hayden Heritage Park Lake will be replaced with concrete and widened. Plans are underway to phase the project so parts of the path system are always available. The new trails will be 12-feet wide to accommodate those who walk, bike, or roll.

If warmer weather means getting out on your bicycle, you'll want to put these dates on your calendar. Ames Mayor John Haila and the Ames City Council are hosting two biking events suitable for all ages.



The annual Mayor and City Council Bike Ride will begin at Ames City Hall, 515 Clark Ave., at 9 a.m. on Saturday, May 18. Bikers should gather in the west parking lot. Bicyclists of all ages and experience levels are

SEWER RATES TO INCREASE IN JULY

The Ames City Council will give final approval soon to a 7 percent increase in sewer rates, effective for bills due on and after July 1, 2024.



The need for the proposed rate adjustment is a reflection of increased operating costs as well as a planned improvement at the Water Pollution Control Facility to achieve higher nutrient removal rates in support of Iowa's Nutrient Reduction Strategy.

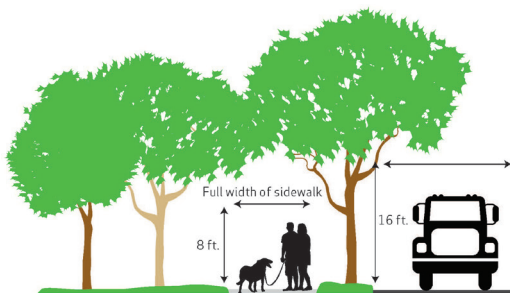
Remember that when you reduce your water use, you not only save on the cost of water but on sewer as well. That is because for most customers, your sewer bill is based on your water usage. Regularly inspect your property and repair any leaks quickly.

Water use outdoors can be a great place to save. Inspect irrigation systems for frozen or broken lines and make sure heads are only delivering water to plantings that truly need to be watered. Consider investing in a rain barrel to help with your outdoor watering and converting traditional turf into low impact, native plantings that need less water. Rebates are available to reduce some of the initial investment at www.CityOfAmes.org/SmartWatersheds.

NEW ORDINANCE REQUIRES SIDEWALKS AND STREET CLEARANCE

As we transition from spring to summer, remember to keep sidewalks clear of debris and vegetation to ensure pedestrian safety. The recently adopted Public Nuisance Ordinance requires a minimum clearance of 8 feet

between the sidewalk and bottom limb of any vegetation. Vegetation is also prohibited from encroaching into the width of the walkway.



Additionally, vegetation hanging over the street should have a minimum clearance of 16 feet between the street

and the bottom limb of any branch. Curb areas adjacent to on-street parking must have a 12-inch buffer where vegetation cannot exceed 12 inches. This allows space for passengers to safely exit a vehicle when parked at the curb.

Other vegetation standards to keep in mind include:

- Noxious weeds, as identified by the State of Iowa, are prohibited on any property
- Turf grasses cannot exceed 12 inches on any property
- Dangerous trees presenting an imminent threat are prohibited from remaining on a property

ENERGY Q&A

Q: Where does Ames get its electricity? Is the Power Plant able to produce all the electricity that Ames needs? How much of our electricity comes from wind and solar, or other renewable sources?

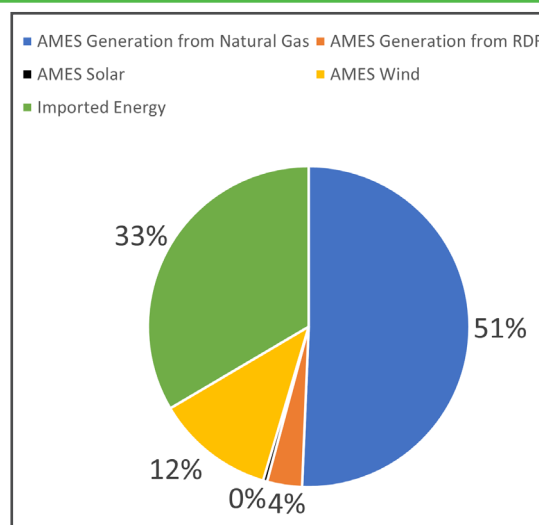
Ames Electric Services has a diverse mix of generation resources to meet 100% of the needs of Ames Electric customers. In addition to our own generation, Ames Electric has long-term contracts for wind and solar energy, and purchases energy from the regional power grid. The pie chart shows where Ames received or generated the electricity needed to power its customers in 2023.

The Ames Power Plant produced about 55% of the energy Ames Electric customers used in 2023. Most of the energy at the Power Plant comes from natural gas and is supplemented by the burning of refuse derived fuel (RDF) produced from Story County garbage. The Power Plant operates under a permit from the State of Iowa that limits the ratio of gas to RDF by weight, up to 30% RDF. The amount of energy attributed to RDF at the Power Plant, which is 4%, is considered renewable energy.

Wind energy from a 30 MW project in Story County supplies about 12% of Ames's annual electric sales.

Ames Electric has a 2 MW SunSmart community solar program called SunSmart. Ames Electric also buys back energy from more than 200 customers who have installed solar at their home or business. Within the Ames Electric utility territory,

there are more than 1.5 MW of distributed solar systems, almost as much as there is at the SunSmart solar farm. Combined, these solar resources make up a bit less than 0.5% of Ames Electric's annual electric usage.



In addition to our own generation, Ames Electric buys electricity from the greater regional grid. It is sometimes cheaper to import energy than to produce it ourselves. Being able to schedule the Power Plant to ramp up production can help insulate Ames from periods of high power costs, but having the ability to import energy at lower cost periods allows us to keep costs low for our customers. In 2023, 16% of Ames Electric's overall generation mix was from renewable sources, including wind, solar, and energy from RDF.
