

### New Location Considered for Welch Avenue Fire Station

Plans to relocate Fire Station No. 2 from its current home on Welch Avenue to a new site along State Avenue are moving forward. The Ames City Council has prioritized this project as a way to increase community safety, improve department response time to incidents, and open new opportunities for redevelopment in Campustown.

Fire Station No. 2, located at 132 Welch Ave., is surrounded by heavy vehicle and pedestrian traffic. Relocating the fire station to State Avenue reduces congestion and makes it easier for emergency vehicles to respond quickly and safely. The new site also places the Ames Fire Department in a better position to serve the city's growing neighborhoods, improving response times across a wider service area. A modern facility designed with best practices for emergency operations will further increase efficiency.

The station relocation continues the partnership between the City of Ames and Iowa State University. The new station would

be built on ISU property south of Baker Subdivision and College Creek. The collaboration helps share costs and strengthens fire protection for both ISU and the City. Finally, moving the fire station off Welch Avenue opens the door for redevelopment of the



existing site in Campustown. Revenue from the future sale of the property would be applied to reduce project debt, making the investment fiscally responsible as well as forward-looking.

Fire Station No. 2 relocation represents a long-term investment in safety, efficiency, and community development. Funding the new station would require a bond referendum and voter approval. For the latest information, go to www.CityOfAmes. org/FireStation.

### AMES POLICE LAUNCH COMMUNITY CAMERA PROGRAM

The Ames Police Department recently introduced the Community Camera Program, a new way for residents and businesses to partner with police in keeping neighborhoods safe.



Security cameras are becoming increasingly common on homes and businesses. While they can deter criminal activity, they can also capture valuable details important to an investigation. Often, neighbors may not realize their camera caught something useful. By knowing where cameras are located, officers can quickly reach out when they need help.

Signing up to participate in the Community Camera Program is simple and completely voluntary. Registering the location of a home or business camera lets Ames Police know a camera exists. It does not give anyone access to it. If something happens nearby, officers may ask owners to check footage and share anything that might help.

The program is free and participants can opt out anytime. Privacy is protected because officers cannot view cameras without owner permission. The Community Camera Program makes it easier for the community and police to work together. Learn more or register a camera at www.CityOfAmes.org/Camera.



Q: How are electric vehicles (EVs) being used across City departments, and what have we learned from their performance so far?

A: Matt Donald and Matt Elbert are two City of Ames supervisors putting Ford Lighting electric trucks to work in their daily operations. Matt Donald, the Assistant Electric Distribution Superintendent, uses the truck for transportation to meetings with contractors and customers. The truck has responded well to its new routine and offers a smooth and responsive performance. Streets Supervisor Matt Elbert with Public Works uses the truck to monitor and inspect projects around the community.

With a maximum charge of 300 miles, the truck can easily support a full week of driving for both departments. "Most weeks I only use about 75% of the charge," Donald said. He typically plugs it in at the warehouse on Friday, which ensures the truck will be ready to go for a full week beginning on Monday.

Elbert admitted that he was initially skeptical about switching to an EV, but the truck has exceeded expectations. One of the standout features that both supervisors appreciate is the pedal response time. It is a noticeable difference when comparing it to a gaspowered vehicle.

"The drivability is really nice. For a base model truck, it's a great daily driver," Donald said.

The City of Ames continues to invest in EV



infrastructure and is expanding with even more projects. Ames Electric Services maintains 20 public EV chargers that add to other charging options throughout the city. To support EV adoption, EV charger rebates are offered at both residential and commercial levels.
